Meeting Notes

February 2011 Speaker

Paul Gagnon, a biologist with the Long Point Region Conservation Authority (LPRCA), spoke to us about how the LPRCA works with local partners to effect environmental improvements.



Since it began in 2000, the Ontario Power Generation's (OBG) Carbon Sequestration and Biodiversity Management program has addressed the need to sequester carbon to offset the greenhouse gas emissions from their fossil fuel plants, combining this with the need to restore wildlife habitat for species emdangered by the highly fragmented landscapes in Southern Ontario. In conjunction with its local partners, the Long Point Biosphere Reserve Foundation (LPBRF) and the LPRCA, OBG has planted more than a million native trees on over 800 acres on 120 private and public properties in Norfolk County.


Planting locations are selected to improve waterway protection, correct erosion problems, increase the amount of available wetlands and create corridors interconnecting fragmented woodlots within the LPRCA watershed. The watershed area, 2782 square kilometres in size, encompasses both Norfolk and Haldimand Counties and includes the Long Point Biosphere, 170 kilometres of Lake Erie shoreline, cold water streams, rich wetlands and Carolinian forests.

Many of the individual projects are done with private landowners and the OBG project focusses on

than transplanting seedlings. Seeded trees immediately send down deep tap roots, a quick benefit not obtained with seedlings; therefore, they begin to provide water retention and carbon sequestration earlier than transplanted trees do. All the projects are monitored to ensure they are providing the desired results over time.

Much of the planting is now done by seeding rather

Your Water, Your Decision

The Great Lakes are the world's single largest source of fresh surface water. This represents about one-fifth of the world's total supply. Nearly forty million people in the United States and Canada get their water from the Great Lakes basin. This is not only drinking water for millions but also a key resource for industry, agriculture, navigation, power generation, recreation and tourism and important for fish and wildlife habitats. While the Great Lakes seem large enough to support all of these uses, in reality less than 1% of the water is renewed each year. This leaves the Great Lakes vulnerable to pollution.

In 1856 a dam was built on the Lynn River in Port Dover to supply power for the Andrew Thompson's 'Norfolk Woolen Mill' (Port Dover Maple Leaf, November 12, 2003). The dam is no longer a source of power.

About a mile upstream is another dam- Ivey's Dam. Water falling over Ivey's Dam stagnates in Silver Lake. The water warms, becomes deoxygenated, is compromised by ducks and geese and then drops into Lake Erie.

Misner Dam plays no role in flood control as the amount of water flowing over Ivey Dam is equal to the amount of water dropping into Lake Erie. Dams that control flood plain reservoirs are maintained at their lowest level. When a flooding situation arises the excess water is captured by raising the dam. As the emergency subsides the water is gradually released in preparation of a subsequent flood. This is not the case with the Misner Dam.

The Lynn River is one of the few cold water streams on the north shore of Lake Erie. It has untold potential. Misner Dam impedes the migration of salmonoides from Lake Erie to fertile spawning beds upstream. An enhanced fishery will be established with the decommissioning of Misner Dam.

We need to make the decision that will be best for our future generations.

Baillie Memorial Fund; and participating migration monitoring stations and conservation organizations - <u>like the NFN, which will receive a portion of the money raised through this Birdathon</u>.
